A slender volume written in the old key. Across fourteen pieces — sonnet, verse, and prose — a seeker addresses the Beloved through veil, whirlwind, tempest, and cloud: Iris opening the eye of perception, the Maiden's crest turning beneath Luna's grace, a dowry given away entire, a final question of which throne one builds, a grail held open, the Shulamite's waltz of surrender, a threefold Holy raised to the Divine Ones, and the dreamweaver's web in which the seeker is willingly caught. Each piece carries a Hebrew name, and several arrive with a foreword to light the way in.
